Royal Economics Society's Annual Lecture

A group of Year 13 Economics students attended The Royal Economics Society's Annual Public Lecture at The Royal Institution Abermarle Street in West London.

The lecture, given by Professor Oriana Bandiera, of The London School of Economics, explored 'what economists really do' – particularly their efforts to analyse and advise on policies to fight extreme poverty and promote economic development that can transform people's lives. The Professor outlined some of the findings of her own research – on providing work for the poorest women in Bangladesh; on promoting vocational training for unemployed youth in Uganda; and on attracting talented community health workers in Zambia. Economic Development is an integral part of A-level Economics and so hopefully the lecture will benefit students in their final exams next summer.

Year 13 Mock Oxbridge Interview Evenings

At the end of November, 19 Oxbridge, Medic and Vet applicants in Year 13 took part in two Interview Preparation Evenings to get them ready for recent and upcoming interviews for these competitive courses. The first was at St Andrew's School in Leatherhead where teachers from local Catholic schools, including 7 members of staff from Salesian, interviewed students and challenged their thinking with Oxbridge-style tasks and questions. The second was held at St George's College in Weybridge where students were interviewed by alumni and experienced professionals in the appropriate fields.

Our Oxbridge applicants were given feedback on their interview technique, which they have been able to employ in their real university interviews. Our students were spoken of extremely highly in their feedback and one interview has even resulted in summer employment, well done Ben Hunt!

We are hoping all these students' hard work will result in offers to study at Oxford or Cambridge or for Medicine or Veterinary Science, it is a tough process to cope with alongside studying for A-levels but these students can be extremely proud of themselves whatever the outcomes.

Year 13 Maths in Action

A-Level Maths students have the opportunity to attend a day of talks that link their academic studies with the wider world. 8 students travelled up to London to hear a range of speakers. Emily Shuckburgh from the British Antarctic Survey explained the graphs behind global warming that go back 800,000 years. Rob Bennett of the Bloodhound organisation spoke of

trying to build a car that will travel 1000 mph. Dr Jamie Frost gave an entertaining revision session, and we had music and maths combined from Ben Sparks and Kyle Evans. The students were left intrigued and inspired, and will be able to develop their interests further.

Year 12 Macroeconomics Lecture

On Wednesday 31 October 2018, the Year 12 economists attended a macroeconomics lecture and workshop hosted by St Peter's School, Guildford. Abby Whiting led the event, an employee of the Bank of England. It was very informative and interesting, focusing on the key roles that the Bank of England carries out on a day-to-day basis to ensure that the UK economy runs smoothly and functions correctly. We found out how the Bank of England sets the base rate of interest at which it lends money to the world's leading banks. In addition, the lecture addressed the complexities of printing the recently revised UK bank notes. We were informed of the organisational structure of the Bank of England, from the Governor (Mark Carney) to the Monetary Policy Committee and other smaller areas that strive to preserve economic stability. The visit was very interesting and encouraged me to take a more active interest in UK macroeconomic policy.

Year 10 Slovakia Exchange

Earlier this term, thirty of our Year 10 students visited our Salesian partner school in Bardejov, Slovakia, accompanied by Miss O'Neill, Mr Bamford, Mr Newman and I. The purpose of this exchange was to look at how critical thinking skills are applied to education in both schools and for staff and students to share their experiences in class-based workshops. In particular, our students participated in workshops surrounding the curriculum areas of RE, Literature, History, Geography and ICT, engaging in discussions and evaluative research with the Slovak counterparts.

Our group also visited a local primary school near the Romani settlement, Postarka. This school was set up by the Salesians to serve the young people from the Romani community, who otherwise might not benefit from a stable education. We were asked to raise money for this school, and successfully raised over £1600, which was gratefully received and is now being put to use to provide extra-curricular facilities and activities for the students.

Other activities included a visit to the High Tatras Mountains, where we enjoyed a walk around the lake in the snowy conditions; the sights were breathtaking! On the final day, we crossed the border into Poland; visiting the city of Krakow in the morning before visiting the memorial at Auschwitz-Birkenau in the afternoon. This was a very moving experience and one that will remain with staff and students forever.

The exchange was beneficial to both of our growing relationships and we hope that our partnership will continue long into the future.

Current position in school
