Gospel Reflection

2017-18: Building the Kingdom from Salesian School

The first of this Sunday's Gospel readings encourages us to focus on blessings; which might seem like a curious thing to do given what Jesus is about to go through.

If you are (and I suspect that everyone reading this will be) fortunate enough to keep your food in a fridge, get your drinking water from a tap, sleep in a bed under a roof and live in a democratic country where you aren't persecuted by the government for your faith, beliefs or politics – then you are already one of the blessed minority in our world. However, we're not always very good at counting our blessings, particularly when facing difficulties or challenges in our lives.

The Gospel reading reminds us that the sacrifice that Jesus was about to make for us on Good Friday was a blessing because he would bring us closer to God. Each of us is called to be a blessing in person by the way we interact with others, this week is a good time to reflect on how well we do this.

The second Gospel reading focuses on Jesus' Passion, his final journey from arrest to crucifixion. Throughout this story we meet very real, very human characters who are presented in very human situations. Many of the challenges that we may have experienced

during Lent or in life in general are right here – staying loyal, keeping faithful, helping others, being brave, controlling anger, resisting pride, embracing humility. Taking some time to reflect on this story this week will provide one with a good bit of spiritual exercise in the lead up to Easter.

Reflections for Holy Week:

-  Which blessings do I sometimes take for granted?
-  Who is a blessing to me?
-  How can I be a blessing to others?
-  Which characters do I identify with in the story of Jesus' Passion? What implications does this have for my relationship with God and others? What might I do about this moving forward?

Current Position in School:

I am currently a Teacher of RE, and Assistant Head of Year 8. How I got into teaching:
